- 14:55 **Judicial Review and Policy Setting – Can They Be Separated?**
In his introduction to the 2021 Government response to the Independent Review of Administrative Law, the then Lord Chancellor wrote of a growing tendency for the courts in Judicial Review cases to become more willing to review the merits of the decisions themselves, instead of the way in which those decisions were made.
Conversely, Dame Sian Elias, former Chief Justice of New Zealand, said in 2008 that judicial review cannot help but engage with policy.
Despite the long-held doctrine that Judicial Review does not deal with policy or merits, do a series of judgments relating to national infrastructure in the last couple of years prove Dame Sian right?
This paper by a former Examining Inspector turned academic will draw on recent judgements and wider thinking about the relationship between the law, the legislature and the executive to examine this increasingly important issue.

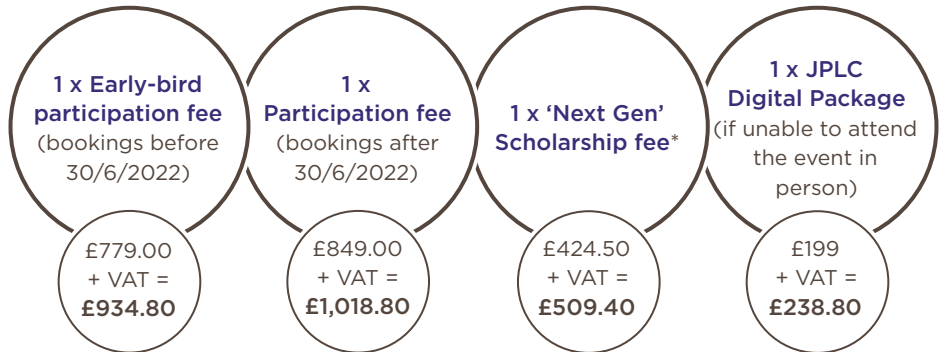
